AND HEALTH WARNING MESSAGES
ON CIGARETTE PACKAGES

SURVEY OF YOUTH

FINAL REPORT

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1.0 INTRODUCTION

Environics Research Group Limited was commissioned by Health Canada in the fall of 2002 to conduct a survey of Canadian youth, including youth smokers and non-smokers. The main objective of the survey was to provide information to assist in the evaluation of the impact of new health warning messages on tobacco packaging on youth knowledge and behaviours. The new health warning messages began appearing on the major tobacco brands in Canada on approximately January 1, 2001, and on all brands as of approximately June 30.

The survey assessed sources of information about the effects of tobacco, awareness and knowledge of the health effects of tobacco, the extent to which specific diseases are believed to be caused by tobacco, and the number of deaths caused by smoking. As well, the survey looked at perceptions of the health effects of chemicals or toxic substances in cigarettes, particularly hydrogen cyanide. The survey also measured awareness and recall of the new warning messages on both the exterior of the packages and on the package slides, their effect on knowledge and behaviours, including behaviours intended to avoid the new labels, perceptions of the effectiveness of the new labels compared to the old labels, and awareness of chemicals or toxic substances present in cigarettes.

A survey of adults and adult smokers was conducted separately and is discussed under separate cover.

One goal of the new surveys was to conduct the sampling and questionnaire design to allow comparison with five previous waves of surveys: surveys conducted by Environics in July 2002 after the new labels had been appearing on all brands for at least a year; in November and December 2001, after the new labels had been appearing on all brands for at least six months; surveys in July 2001, after the new labels had appeared on all brands; surveys conducted in March and April 2001, a few months after the new health warning messages were introduced into the marketplace; and baseline surveys, which were conducted in November and December 2000, prior to the introduction of the new health warning messages into the marketplace.

The survey of youth aged 12 to 18 years, which included youth smokers and non-smokers, is based on a sample size of 1,003. This survey was conducted between December 10 and 21, 2002. A survey based on a sample of 1,000 has a margin of error of approximately 3.1 percentage points, 19 times in 20.

This report summarizes the findings of the research. Appended to this report are copies of the English and French questionnaires and a description of the survey methods.

2.0 SMOKING STATUS

A. Smoking Behaviour and Brands

From the survey, ten percent of youth smoke cigarettes every day and five percent smoke occasionally. Older youth, especially those aged 17 to 18 years, are more likely than younger teens to say they smoke cigarettes every day.

Among non-smoking youth, one in three (30%) say they have at some time tried cigarette smoking, which includes just having a few puffs. Among non-smoking youth who have never tried smoking, not even a few puffs, six percent say they have seriously thought about trying smoking. Among all non-smoking youth, two percent say they might try smoking within the next month.

Of the youth sample, 15 percent are smokers and 85 percent are non-smokers. Of all youth, 30 percent can be classified as potential smokers. Potential smokers include any youth who say they have tried smoking, have seriously thought about smoking or think they might try smoking within the next month.

Fewer than two in ten Canadian youth (16%) report having smoked at least 100 cigarettes in their life. This number is twice as high among older youth, aged 17 to 18 years.

Note: For tables with December 2002 data only, GP signifies general youth population, S signifies smokers and PS signifies potential smokers.

Among youth smokers who smoke every day, 22 percent report smoking more than 15 cigarettes per day, which includes four percent who say they smoke more than 25 cigarettes per day. Five in ten (48%) say they smoke between ten and 15 cigarettes per day, and three in ten (29%) report smoking fewer than ten cigarettes per day.

Among youth smokers who smoke occasionally,¹ about eight in ten (82%) report smoking fewer than ten cigarettes per day on the days that they smoke. Thirteen percent smoke between ten and 15 cigarettes per day and three percent report smoking more than 15 cigarettes per day. Two percent offer no response to the question.

Among youth smokers, Player's Light Regular Size (18%) is most often mentioned as their regular brand of cigarettes. Smaller proportions mention DuMaurier King Size (12%), DuMaurier Light King Size (8%), Craven "A" King Size (8%), DuMaurier Regular Size (5%), Export "A" Regular Size (5%) and DuMaurier Light Regular Size (5%). Thirty-nine percent mention some other brand and two percent say they do not have a regular brand.

When youth smokers are asked if they smoke any other brands of cigarettes, 62 percent say they do not smoke any other brand.

B. Quit Attempts and Potential Quitters

Two-thirds of youth smokers (65%) report having tried to quit smoking; about one-third (35%) have not tried to quit.

Among youth smokers who have tried to quit smoking,² just under nine in ten (88%) say they have stopped smoking for a period of 24 hours at least once in the past year, in an attempt to quit. Eleven percent say they have not attempted to quit smoking in the past year.

More than six in ten youth smokers (64%) report they are now seriously thinking of quitting smoking; fewer than four in ten (36%) say they are not.

Among youth smokers who are seriously thinking about quitting smoking,³ five in ten (49%) say they will try to quit within the next 30 days. Forty-two percent say they will try to quit within the next six months. Nine percent say they will not try within the next six months.

The number of youth smokers who have tried to quit is higher in the current survey than in July 2002; however, it should be noted that due to the small sample size, this increase is not significant. Similarly, the number of potential quitters is larger in the current survey than in any previous survey, but the change is not statistically significant. The current results also suggest no significant change in the number of potential quitters who think they will try to quit within 30 days.⁴

Among youth smokers who are seriously thinking about quitting smoking,⁵ about four in ten say they will use will power or go cold turkey (42%) to try to quit smoking. Smaller numbers say they would use nicotine gum (23%), use the nicotine patch (19%) or chew gum/candy/food (8%). A total of three percent mention Zyban (2%) or prescription drugs in general (1%). Sixteen percent mention some other ways or methods and six percent offer no opinion.

While these results should be interpreted with caution due to the small sample size, they do suggest a shift among youth smokers who are seriously thinking about quitting toward the use of nicotine-replacement cessation products such as gum and the patch.

3.0 HEALTH EFFECTS OF SMOKING

A. General and Top-of-mind Effects

More than eight in ten youth (85%) think that cigarette smoking is a major health problem in Canada. Another 13 percent think it is a minor problem. Only two percent think it is not a health problem.

The results of the current survey are almost identical to those found in the previous surveys.

The view that smoking is a major health problem is lower among youth smokers. Among non-smoking youth, those identified as potential smokers are also slightly less likely to say smoking is a major health problem.

When asked what specific human health effects or diseases can be caused by smoking cigarettes, youth are most likely to mention lung cancer (59%). Smaller proportions mention cancer in general (37%), heart attack/disease/angina (21%), oral cancer - tongue, lips, mouth, throat (15%), lung disease (15%), emphysema (11%), gum disease/tooth loss/mouth disease (6%), asthma (5%), respiratory problems/difficulty breathing/shortness of breath (4%) and yellow teeth/fingers/effect on appearance (4%). Thirty-four percent mention other human health effects or diseases.

There have been slight increases since July 2002 in the proportions who mention lung cancer and heart attack/disease/angina. The results of the current survey are similar to those found in December 2000.

Boys are more likely than girls to mention lung cancer. Older youth and youth smokers are more likely than others to mention emphysema. Among non-smoking youth, potential smokers are slightly more likely to mention lung cancer, oral cancer and emphysema.

B. Sources of Information about Health Effects

When asked where they have recently seen or heard information which talks about the health effects of smoking cigarettes, the largest proportions of youth mention television (56%) and school/university (47%). This is followed by mention of cigarette packages (24%), magazines (16%), word of mouth/family/friends (15%), newspapers (8%), billboards (6%) and radio (6%). Twenty-two percent mention other sources of information and four percent say nowhere.

The results of the current survey find that the number of youth who have seen or heard information about the health effects of smoking cigarettes on cigarette packages has decreased by eight points from July 2002, but is a total of 11 points higher than in December 2000. The number who mention school/university is ten points higher than in July 2002, and is similar to the numbers found in December 2000 and November-December 2001.

Older youth, youth smokers and potential youth smokers are more likely than others to have seen this information on cigarette packages on television. Older youth are also more likely to mention magazines. Youth aged 12 to 16 are more likely to mention school/university.

c. Specific Health Effects Caused by Smoking

In this section of the survey, respondents were read a list of health effects and diseases, and were asked the extent to which they agreed or disagreed that each can be caused by smoking cigarettes.

An overwhelming majority of youth strongly agree that lung cancer (95%) can be caused by smoking cigarettes. Large majorities strongly agree that smoking can cause heart disease (78%), gum or mouth diseases (75%), throat cancer (73%), mouth cancer (69%), asthma (71%) and premature death (61%). Smaller majorities strongly agree that smoking can cause smaller babies or reduced growth of babies during pregnancy (53%), chronic bronchitis (53%) and stroke (52%).

Fewer than half of youth strongly agree that smoking can cause wrinkles and premature aging (48%), emphysema (42%), premature birth or preterm birth (39%), blood clots (36%), miscarriages (36%), impotence in men (26%), stomach ulcers (24%) and infertility (23%). Fewer than two in ten each strongly agree that smoking can cause bladder cancer (19%), Multiple Sclerosis (15%), arthritis (13%), Alzheimer's Disease (13%), acne (11%), hepatitis (11%) and gangrene (10%).

The results of the current survey suggest that there have been slight decreases from the July 2002 survey in the proportions of youth who strongly agree that blood clots and premature death can be caused by smoking. Comparison with the baseline survey in December 2000 suggests that there have been increases in the numbers of Canadian youth who strongly agree that impotence in men, infertility, emphysema, gum or mouth diseases and stroke can be caused by smoking.

Among youth, girls are more likely than boys to strongly agree that smoking can cause asthma, chronic bronchitis, miscarriages, smaller babies or reduced growth of babies during pregnancy, and premature birth or preterm birth.

D. Specific Health Effects Caused by Second-hand Smoke

In this section of the survey, respondents were read a list of health effects in non-smokers, and were asked about the extent to which they agreed or disagreed that each can be caused by second-hand smoke.

Majorities of youth strongly agree that second-hand smoke can cause asthma attacks in children (67%), lung cancer in non-smokers (64%), chest infections in children (55%) and bronchitis in children (52%). Fewer than half strongly agree that second-hand smoke can cause heart disease in non-smoking adults (45%), strokes in non-smoking adults (26%), SIDS (Sudden Infant Death Syndrome) or crib death (24%) and ear infections in children (16%). Only about one in ten each strongly agree that second-hand smoke can cause arthritis (11%), Multiple Sclerosis (10%) and Alzheimer's Disease (9%) in non-smoking adults.

The results of the current survey suggest that there have been slight increases since July 2002 in the proportions of youth who strongly agree that lung cancer in non-smokers, heart disease in non-smoking adults and ear infections in children can be caused by second-hand smoke. Comparison with the baseline survey of December 2000 suggests that there have been increases in the proportions of youth who strongly agree that second-hand smoke can cause lung cancer in non-smokers, and heart disease and strokes in non-smoking adults.

Among youth, girls are more likely than boys to strongly agree that second-hand smoke can cause SIDS, asthma attacks, ear infections, chest infections and bronchitis in children. Boys are more likely than girls to strongly agree that second-hand smoke can cause heart disease in non-smoking adults. Older youth are more likely than others to strongly agree that second-hand smoke can cause asthma attacks, chest infections and bronchitis in children. Younger youth, aged 12 to 14 years, are more likely than others to strongly agree that second-hand smoke can cause heart disease, arthritis, strokes and Multiple Sclerosis in non-smoking adults.

E. Health Effects Caused by Hydrogen Cyanide

When asked, top-of-mind, three-quarters of youth (75%) offer no specific health effects or diseases that can be caused by hydrogen cyanide. Another six percent say hydrogen cyanide does not cause any health effects or diseases. Twenty-nine percent mention specific health effects or diseases, including seven percent who mention lung disease/cancer.

The survey finds that the number of youth who say hydrogen cyanide does not cause any health effects or diseases is essentially unchanged from July 2002, but is a total of 18 points lower than that found in December 2000. The number mentioning lung disease/cancer is five points higher in the current survey than in the December 2000 baseline survey.

4.0 DEATHS FROM TOBACCO USE

Respondents were asked whether they believe that tobacco use kills more or fewer numbers of Canadians than a number of other causes of death.

Between half and two-thirds of youth think tobacco use kills more Canadians each year than do suicides (66%), murders (63%), alcohol (57%), illegal drugs (56%), car accidents (53%) and AIDS (50%).

Between one-third and one-half of youth believe that tobacco use kills fewer or the same number of Canadians each year as these other causes of death.

The results of the current survey suggest a slight decrease from July 2002 in the proportion of youth who think tobacco use kills more Canadians each year than AIDS. The current survey also suggests that, since December 2000, there have been increases in the numbers of youth who think that tobacco use kills more Canadians each year than most of these other causes of death.

Those who have seen, read or heard about the health warning messages now appearing on cigarette packages are more likely to think that tobacco use kills more Canadians each year than does alcohol.

Potential smokers among non-smoking youth are more likely to think that tobacco kills more each year than murders. Youth smokers are more likely to think that tobacco kills more each year than do most of these other causes of death.

A total of 23 percent of youth correctly believe that approximately 45,000 Canadians die each year as a result of tobacco use. Four in ten (39%) pick a number lower than 45,000 and one-third (34%) choose a number higher than 45,000.

The survey finds that the number of youth who correctly believe that approximately 45,000 Canadians die each year as a result of tobacco use has decreased five points from the July 2002 survey, but is a total of five points higher than that found in the December 2000 survey.

5.0 HEALTH WARNING MESSAGES

A. Recall and Reads Per Day

An overwhelming number of youth (95%) say they have seen health warning messages on cigarette packages. Youth smokers (98%) express almost unanimous recall.

The number of youth who say they have seen health warning messages on cigarette packages is essentially unchanged from the previous surveys.

Three-quarters of youth (74%) say they have seen, read or heard about the health warning messages that are now on cigarette packages in Canada and another four percent say they may have. Two in ten (20%) say they have not.

It should be noted that in the current survey, when asked about “health warning messages that are now on cigarette packages in Canada” in this question, respondents were provided with the additional explanatory phrase “that is, the new messages that began appearing on cigarette packages at the beginning of 2001” in order to clarify the meaning of the question.

The number of youth who say they have seen, read or heard about new health warning messages increased 17 points from the July 2002 survey, and is now a total of 46 points higher than that found in December 2000.

Older youth, especially those aged 17 to 18 years, youth smokers and potential youth smokers are more likely to be aware of these health warning messages.

Older youth, particularly those aged 17 to 18 years, youth smokers and potential youth smokers are more likely to say they have seen the new health warning messages on cigarette packages themselves.

Among youth smokers, nine in ten (91%) say they have seen these health warning messages on their main brand of cigarettes. Eight percent have not.

The current survey finds an increase of 11 points from July 2002 in the number of youth smokers who say they have seen these health warning messages on their main brand of cigarettes; this proportion is 17 points higher than that found in March-April 2001.

Fourteen percent of youth report that they look at or read health warning messages on cigarette packages several times a day and another 14 percent do this about once a day. Six in ten (59%) look at or read these health warning messages less frequently, including 26 percent who say they do this less than once a week. Thirteen percent say they never look at or read these health warning messages.

The results of the current survey are similar to those found in July 2002 and also to those found in December 2000.

It should be noted that in previous surveys, respondents were asked about “new health warning messages” in this and other questions dealing directly with the awareness, content, or effect on behaviour of these messages. In the current survey, this wording was altered to refer to “health warning messages that are now on cigarette packages in Canada” in all of these questions, in order to clarify the meaning of the question.

The results of the current survey suggest an increase from July 2002 in the number of youth mentioning more information than before, and a decrease in the number who offer no opinion. The findings also suggest increases, though not always statistically significant, in the numbers of youth mentioning specific images or design elements such as pictures of lungs or diseases of mouth or teeth. Comparison with the March-April 2001 survey shows a decline of 12 points in the number of youth mentioning pictures in general, and a trend toward increased mention of specific images.

Older youth, particularly those aged 17 to 18 years, and potential youth smokers are more likely to mention that the new health warning messages on cigarette packages have pictures. Youth aged 12 to 16 years are more likely to mention that they have more information than before or more information about the health effects of smoking, and those aged 12 to 14 years of age are more likely to mention pictures of lungs. Youth smokers, potential smokers among non-smoking youth, those who have seen, heard or read about the health warning messages now on cigarette packages, and those who have seen these messages on cigarette packages themselves are more likely than others to mention pictures.

When asked, top-of-mind, what specific health warning messages they can remember seeing on cigarette packages now in Canada (without looking at a cigarette package), the largest proportion of youth recall the message causes lung cancer (29%). Other recalled messages include harmful to others/children (18%), impotence (14%), harmful during pregnancies, harmful to fetus or low birth rate (13%), heart disease (9%), death or premature death (9%), cancer in general (8%), lung disease (8%), mouth or gum disease (8%) and second-hand smoke is harmful/dangerous (8%). Thirty-five percent mention some other health warning message. A total of one-one-quarter say none (16%) or offer no opinion (9%).

Since July, there has been a six-point decrease in the number of youth who mention harmful during pregnancies, harmful to fetus or low birth rate and increases of five and ten points, respectively, in the numbers who mention harmful to others/children and causes lung cancer.

Older youth, particularly those aged 17 to 18 years, youth smokers and potential youth smokers are more likely to mention the message regarding impotence. Youth smokers and potential youth smokers are also more likely to recall the warning message harmful to others/children. Potential youth smokers are more likely to mention harmful during pregnancies. Youth smokers are less likely than others to mention the message “causes lung cancer.”

Those who have seen, read or heard about the health warning messages now on cigarette packages and those who have seen these messages on cigarette packages themselves are more likely than those who have not to recall messages regarding impotence and harmful to others/children. Those who have seen these messages on cigarette packages themselves are also more likely to recall the message “causes lung cancer.”

Other recalled images include bad, rotten or big teeth (20%), pregnant women/with cigarettes (18%), heart or diseased heart (14%), children, kids or babies (12%), mouth or diseased mouth (12%), limp, broken or burning cigarette (10%), parents/mom/dad/smoking (8%), brain or diseased brain (7%), gums or diseased gums (6%) and lung cancer (5%). Forty-two percent recall other images or graphics. Fewer than two in ten say “none” (11%) or offer no opinion (4%).

The results of the current survey suggest that there has been a slight decrease from July 2002 in the number of youth who recall images of pregnant women/with cigarettes, and a slight increase over the same period in the number who recall lungs or diseased lungs. The results also suggest that, since March-April 2001, there have been increases in the numbers of youth recalling messages such as lungs or diseased lungs, pregnant women/with cigarettes, mouth/diseased mouth and baby/premature baby; there has also been a decrease of 12 points in the number who say they cannot recall any pictures or image (“none”).

Girls are slightly more likely than boys to recall bad, rotten or big teeth and pregnant women/with cigarettes. Boys are slightly more likely than girls to recall heart or diseased heart. Older youth, particularly those aged 17 to 18 years, are more likely to recall bad, rotten or big teeth.

Potential youth smokers are more likely to recall bad, rotten or big teeth, pregnant women/with cigarettes, mouth or diseased mouth, children, kids or babies and limp, broken or burning cigarette. Youth smokers are more likely to recall bad, rotten or big teeth, children, kids or babies, brain or diseased brain and gums or diseased gums; they are less likely to recall lungs or diseased lungs.

Those who have seen, read or heard about the health warning messages now on cigarette packages, and those who have seen these messages on cigarette packages themselves are more likely than those who have not to recall lungs or diseased lungs and bad, rotten or big teeth.

B. Impact of Current Messages

Among youth smokers, about five in ten (49%) say that the health warning messages now on cigarette packages have been very effective in informing them about the health effects of cigarette smoking.

Between one-quarter and one-third say that these messages have been very effective in increasing their desire to quit smoking (33%), getting them to try to quit smoking (29%), getting them to smoke less around others than they used to (27%) and getting them to smoke less (24%).

Combining the numbers who say very and somewhat effective, 85 percent of youth smokers say the messages now on cigarette packages have been effective overall in informing them about health effects and between about six and seven in ten (each) say they have been effective in increasing their desire to quit smoking (71%), getting them to try to quit smoking (64%), getting them to smoke less (60%) and getting them to smoke less around others than they used to (58%).

The current survey suggests that there have been increases from July 2002 in the numbers of youth smokers who say the new health warning messages have been very effective in all areas examined except for that of informing them about health effects of smoking. Compared to March-April 2001, the numbers who say the labels have been very effective on all of these dimensions have increased.

c. Assessment of Current Messages

About seven in ten youth each strongly agree that the health warning messages now on cigarette packages provide them with important information about the health effects of smoking cigarettes (71%) and that these messages are accurate (69%), and almost six in ten strongly agree that these messages make smoking seem less attractive (56%).

Combining the numbers who strongly and somewhat agree, almost all youth agree that the messages provide important information (94%) and that the messages are accurate (93%). Eight in ten youth agree that the health warning messages make smoking seem less attractive (80%).

d. Comparison of Current and Old Messages

When youth are asked to compare the health messages now on cigarette packages to the old health warning messages, about eight in ten each say that the new messages are more effective than the old in informing them about the health effects of smoking (82%) and in encouraging them not to take up smoking (81%). Fewer than one in ten each think the old messages are more effective in these two areas.

The results of the current survey are similar to those found in previous surveys.

Potential smokers, those who have seen read or heard about the health warning messages now on cigarette packages, and those who have seen these messages on cigarette packages themselves are more likely to think the health warning messages now on cigarette packages are more effective than the old health warning messages in both these areas. Youth smokers are more likely than non-smoking youth to think that these messages are more effective in informing them about the health effects of smoking.

When youth smokers are asked to compare the health warning messages now on cigarette packages to the old health warning messages, more than eight in ten each say the current messages are more effective than the old in getting them to try to quit smoking (84%), increasing their desire to quit smoking (84%) and getting them to smoke less (82%). Three-quarters of youth say that the current messages are more effective than the old messages in getting them to smoke less around others than they used to (75%). About one in ten or fewer each think that the old messages are more effective in achieving any of these outcomes.

Since July 2002, there have been increases in the numbers of youth smokers who think that the current health warning messages are more effective than the old messages in getting them to smoke less, in getting them to try to quit smoking and in increasing their desire to quit smoking.

E. Avoidance of Messages

Youth smokers were asked whether, since the beginning of the year (2002), they have ever concealed a health warning message on a cigarette package, either by placing a cover over the package or by transferring their cigarettes to another container.

More than six in ten youth smokers (65%) have not made any attempt to conceal any health warning messages. A total of about one-third of youth smokers have concealed a health warning message by placing a cover over the pack (14%), by transferring their cigarettes to another container (15%), or by both methods (5%).

The results of the current survey are similar to those found in July 2002.

Among those youth smokers who have concealed a new health warning message since the beginning of the year (2002),⁶ almost four in ten (37%) say they have done this more than ten times, 22 percent say between three and ten times, and 41 percent say once or twice.

F. Awareness of Messages on Slide

When asked, top-of-mind, if they can recall or describe anything they saw or read on the back of the slide portion of a cigarette package (without looking at a cigarette package), three-quarters of Canadian youth either offer no opinion (43%) or say they have not seen the slide portion (35%). Seven percent mention tips to stop smoking and five percent mention health warnings in general. Eighteen percent mention other items.

Older youth and youth smokers are more likely than others to recall tips to stop smoking; youth smokers are also more likely to recall health warnings in general.

About one-half (52%) of youth smokers strongly agree that the information they have seen on the back of the slide is accurate, and about four in ten (38%) strongly agree that the information is useful to them. Combining the strongly and somewhat agree numbers, 74 percent of youth smokers agree the information is accurate, and 64 percent say it is useful to them.

6.0 TOXIC SUBSTANCES

A. Awareness of Toxic Substances

When youth are asked, top-of-mind, what, if any, chemicals or toxic substances they can name that are in cigarettes or cigarette smoke, the largest proportions mention tar (42%) and nicotine (42%). Thirteen percent mention tobacco, nine percent mention carbon monoxide, and eight percent mention poison/rat poison/strychnine/cyanide. Forty percent mention other toxic substances. Nineteen percent offer no opinion.

Since December 2000, there has been a six-point drop (each) in the numbers of youth mentioning tar and nicotine. The current survey results suggest a trend over the same period toward somewhat more frequent mentions of specific toxic chemical substances such as hydrogen cyanide, formaldehyde and ammonia.

Older youth and youth smokers are more likely to mention nicotine, tar and carbon monoxide. Youth aged 12 to 14 years are more likely to mention tobacco. Potential youth smokers are more likely to mention tar.

Those who have seen, read or heard about the health warning messages now on cigarette packages and those who have seen these messages on cigarette packages themselves are more likely to mention nicotine and tar.

Six percent mention carbon monoxide. Fourteen percent mention some other toxic substance. Nine percent say there are no chemicals or toxic substances currently listed on cigarette packages, and 57 percent offer no opinion.

Since December 2000, there has been a decrease of 13 points in the number of youth who say there are no toxic substances listed on cigarette packages, and an increase of 14 points in the number who offer no response to the question.

Older youth, particularly those aged 17 to 18 years and youth smokers are more likely to mention nicotine, tar and carbon monoxide. Potential youth smokers, those who have seen, read or heard about the health warning messages now on cigarette packages and those who have seen these messages on cigarette packages themselves are more likely to mention nicotine and tar.

When asked what chemicals or substances in cigarettes, in tobacco or in smoking, if any, cause or can cause disease or harm to health, the largest proportions of youth mention nicotine (24%) and tar (22%). Smaller proportions mention carbon monoxide (7%) and tobacco (5%). Nine percent say that all the chemicals cause harm, and 15 percent mention other specific substances. Forty-three percent offer no opinion.

B. Impact of Information about Toxic Substances

About one-half each of youth smokers say that the information about chemicals and toxic substances now on the side of cigarette packages has contributed to encouraging them to try to quit smoking (53%) and increasing their desire to quit smoking (53%). Just under one-half say this information has contributed to getting them to smoke less (46%). About two in ten (23%) say the information has contributed to getting them to switch to a different brand or product.

SURVEY METHODS

The results of the survey are based on questions asked to 1,003 youth between 12 and 18 years of age, living within the ten provinces of Canada. The survey was conducted by telephone from December 10 to 21, 2002.

SAMPLE SELECTION

The sampling method was designed to complete approximately 1,000 interviews with youths between 12 and 18 years of age in the ten provinces, proportionate to the incidence of youths of these ages in each province relative to the incidence of youth in the population of Canada. Using population data, the relative proportions of youths of each of these ages in the populations of each province were derived and used as the basis of the sampling frame.

Environics uses a RDD (random digit dialling) sample selection technique. Telephone numbers are selected from the most recently published telephone directories, thus ensuring that only valid telephone exchanges are used. These numbers act as “seeds” or elements from which the sample is randomly generated. The numbers in the sample elements are selected in such a way that they are representative of the geographic area(s) under study. This sample selection technique ensures both unlisted numbers and numbers listed after the directory publication are included in the sample.

A total of 23,109 telephone numbers were drawn. From within each household contacted, respondents between 12 and 18 years of age were screened for random selection using the “most recent birthday” method. The use of this technique produces results that are as valid and effective as enumerating all eligible persons within a household and selecting one randomly.

Additional screening was performed to exclude households in which the respondent or another household member was employed in advertising, market research, the media or a tobacco company.

In the data analysis, the results of the survey were weighted to reflect the actual proportion of over- and under-sampled segments in the population: in this case, weighting was by age, gender and region.

TELEPHONE INTERVIEWING

Interviewing was conducted at Environics’ central facilities in Toronto and Montreal. Field supervisors were present at all times to ensure accurate interviewing and recording of responses. Ten percent of each interviewer’s work was unobtrusively monitored for quality control in accordance with the standards set out by the Canadian Association of Marketing Research Organizations.

A minimum of five calls were made to a household before classifying it as a “no answer.”

COMPLETION RESULTS

A total of 1,003 interviews were completed. The margin of error for a sample of 1,003 is ± 3.1 percentage points, 19 times in 20. The margins are wider for regional and demographic subsamples.
