<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Cook Islands: Warnings are to either comply with the Australian or New Zealand requirements (which include pictures), or to require 50% text warnings with specified messages in English and in Cook Islands Maori. In practice, packages contain pictures as required in Australia/New Zealand.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> Australia, in addition to the 90% warning on the package back, also requires a fire risk statement on the bottom 10% of the package back. Thus in total Australia has required messages covering 75% of the front and 100% of the back, for an average of 87.5% of the package front and back.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>3</sup> Thailand has adopted a requirement for picture-based warnings to cover 85% of the package front and back, but implementation of this requirement has been delayed.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>4</sup> Implementation of picture warnings in Sri Lanka has been delayed.
